



Hon. Henrietta H. Fore CEO, Holsman International

Henrietta H. Fore is a recognized leader in the United Nations, business, nonprofit organizations and the U.S. Government. From 2018 to 2022, Ms. Fore served as executive director of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), working in 192 countries and territories to save children's lives, to defend their rights, and to help them fulfill their potential. Programs include the world's largest procurement and delivery of childhood and COVID vaccines and connecting every school and learner to distance learning and the internet to reimagine education with foundational, transferable, occupational and digital skills.

Since stepping down from UNICEF on January 31, 2022, Henrietta has joined the corporate boards of Imperative Care, EQT Future, Global Preparedness Monitoring Board, and the Center for Strategic and International Studies. Ms. Fore has worked with leaders across the world. From 2007 to 2009, she served as the administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), and director of United States Foreign Assistance. Ms. Fore was the first woman to serve in these roles. In 2009, she received the Distinguished Service Award, the highest award the Secretary of State can bestow.

Ms. Fore has a Bachelor of Arts in History from Wellesley College and a Master of Science in Public Administration from the University of Northern Colorado. She studied International Politics at Oxford University and Corporate Boards at Stanford University Graduate School of Business.



Yetunde Ayo Oyalowo Founder & CEO, Market Doctors

Dr. Yetunde Ayo Oyalowo is the founder of Market Doctors, a social enterprise creating access to healthcare in the informal sector of Nigeria through mobile clinics and health posts in market locations. The informal sector makes up 75% of the population of Nigeria, and with a ratio of 1:5,000 doctors to patients, it is imperative that the people of this sector receive treatment that is affordable and accessible. Through Market Doctors, Dr. Avo Ovalowo has partnered with more than 100 corporations and pharmaceutical companies to provide Nigerians with access to affordable drugs and medicine. She is also a member of the Advocacy and Resource Mobilization Malaria Partnership Committee. She earned a Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Science degree at University of Ilorin and a Master of Public Health from the University of Lagos.



Chief executive and secretary for the Vicky Robertson Ministry for the Environment (MfE), New Zealand

Vicky Robertson is the New Zealand Secretary for the Environment, appointed in April 2015. An internationally experienced executive with a background in law and economics, Vicky is a champion for diversity and inclusion, te ao Māori and achieving transparency and accountability in the state sector. Vicky has experience across a range of complex policy frameworks. She provides system leadership to deliver significant reform programs, including reforming the approach to climate change, improving freshwater quality and reforming the resource management system. Vicky enjoys working on these reforms in partnership with Māori, Treaty partners.

Bringing in different perspectives and working with stakeholders such as local government, the food and fiber sector, environmental eNGOs, and business have been a critical part of Vicky's leadership. She looks to innovate in collaborative approaches, leading the Climate Change Chief Executives Board, the formal joint venture Board of Chief Executives leading the reform of the resource management system and setting up the public/private sector collaboration The Aotearoa Circle.

Vicky is passionate about diversity and inclusion as a critical factor in high performing organizations. She has worked with iwi, hapū and Māori. She has embedded te ao Māori and the Treaty of Waitangi as essential principles to MfE's work. Vicky puts people first and is currently leading the Ministry's development of an organization-wide wellbeing framework.

Ellen Jackowski joined Mastercard as the company's chief sustainability officer in July 2022. Former deputy director general for Science. International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis

Leena Srivastava is the former deputy director general for Science of the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA), Austria. Prior to this, she was the vice chancellor of the TERI School of Advanced Studies, New Delhi - an interdisciplinary higher education institution focused on sustainable development. She has more than three decades of research experience in the areas of energy, environment and climate change policies at the Energy and Resources Institute (TERI), including nearly nine years as its executive director.

She is a member of various committees and boards both at the international and national levels. including the co-chair of the Science Advisory Group for the UNSG's Global Climate Action Summit, the co-chair on the Science Advisory Committee of Future Earth, and a member of the Asian Development Bank President's Advisory Group on Climate and Sustainable Development.

She has a master's degree in Economics from the University of Hyderabad and a PhD in Energy Economics from the Indian Institute of Science in Bangalore, India.



[moderator] Executive director of the BRIDGES Coalition Steven Hartman in UNESCO's Management of Social Transformations

Steven Hartman (Ph.D., M.F.A., B.A.) is Executive Director of the BRIDGES Coalition in UNESCO's Management of Social Transformations program. This role is anchored in the BRIDGES Flagship Hub at ASU's Julie Ann Wrigley Global Futures Laboratory. Dr. Hartman's scientific work promotes interdisciplinary collaboration among artists, researchers, educators and civil society to help mobilize public action on climate change. For a decade he led the Nordic Network for Interdisciplinary Environmental Studies (NIES), one of the first widely cross-disciplinary networks of environmental humanities researchers. As lead author, he and his co-authors were awarded the St. Andrews Article Prize in European Environmental History for "Medieval Iceland, Greenland, and the New Human Condition: A case study in integrated environmental humanities" published in Global and Planetary Change (2017). Dr. Hartman convenes the Humanities for the Environment Circumpolar Observatory group anchored at the Stefansson Arctic Institute in Akureyri, Iceland. He is also Visiting Professor in the Faculty of History and Philosophy at University of Iceland. A member of the Scientific Steering committee of the Future Earth core project IHOPE (Integrated History and Future of People on Earth), he is senior co-editor of the new book series Global Challenges in Environmental Humanities (Bloomsbury Academic) and he serves on the editorial board of the series Future Humanities (Wiley).
